

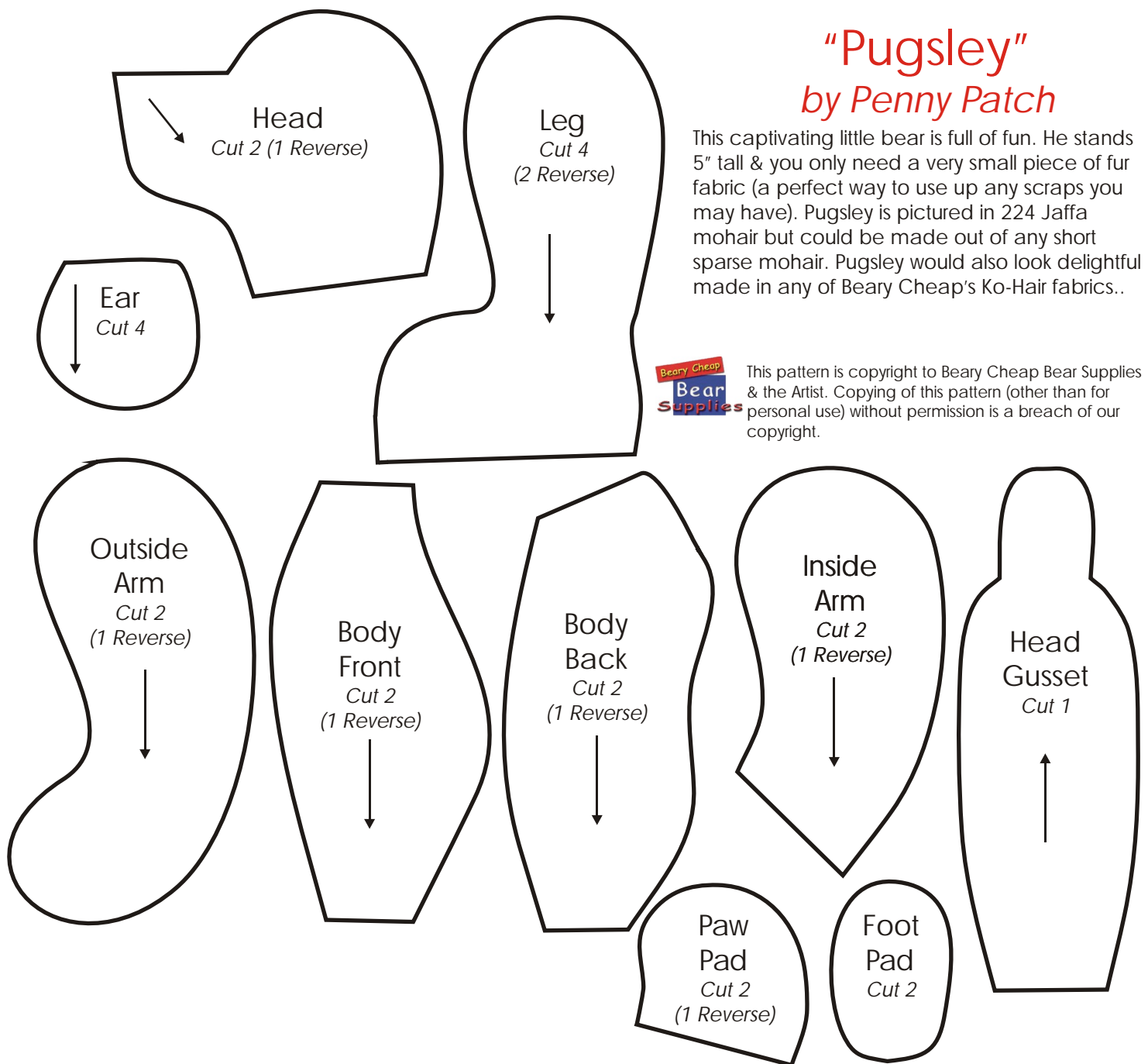
"Pugsley"

This captivating little bear is full of fun. He stands 5" tall & you only need a very small piece of fur fabric (a perfect way to use up any scraps you may have). Pugsley is pictured in 224 Jaffa mohair but could be made out of any short sparse mohair. Pugsley would also look delightful made in any of Beary Cheap's Ko-Hair fabrics..

"Pugsley" is a 5" (13cm) mohair Character bear designed by Penny Patch from NSW, Australia.

You will need the following items to make "Pugsley". [All items are available from www.bearycheap.com](http://www.bearycheap.com)

- 17x35cm piece of 224 Jaffa (Feather Sparse Mohair) or short pile fabric of your choice
- Square of super suede or maxi suede for paws
- 1 x 13mm lock nut joint set
- 1 pair of 4mm black glass eyes
- 1 x 5ply Dark Brown perle cotton for nose
- 1 x reel of matching sewing thread
- Polyflock Stuffing
- Plastic or glass beads are optional for a "cute flopsy feel".

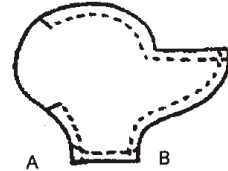
Additional instructions to make Pugsley

If you wish to achieve Pugsley's "cocked" head position, please use the instructions below instead of the basic bear making instructions leaflet when sewing & jointing the head as it is a different method. All other instructions on this page are provided by the Artist to help achieve the best results.

Sewing Head

When sewing head, be sure to leave an opening to install the head joint

Now sew base of the head closed in a curve from A to B

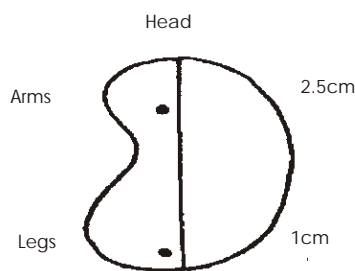


Jointing Head

Insert screw from inside head, passing it through the base of the head beside the curved seam. This will put "Pugsley's" head to one side. Joint head to body where all seams cross at top.

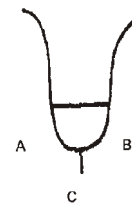
Arms & Legs

These should be jointed in the position as shown



Nose

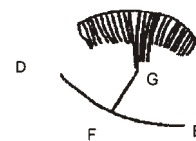
Draw shape of nose onto your bear or use a Nose Template. Make shape smaller than actual size. Work with a single thread from A to B and from B to C and from A to C. This gives the basic shape to embroider and adds a little fullness to the nose. Continue to work from A to C and B to C alternatively.



Mouth

Bring the thread out at D & stitch to E. Thread out at F & back in at G. Make sure the twist of the smile matches in with the tilt of the head.

Eyebrows are optional but a cute quizzical look, stitch them as per diagram. For a worried look, the eyebrows frown.



"Pugsley" Pattern Layout

Lay your pattern pieces onto your fabric in this format to ensure they all fit on & you have your arrows running in the same direction as the pile. Trace pattern pieces onto your fabric making sure all your pieces fit on before you start cutting.
